
They are required by law to meet annually in March, and their statutory powers and duties include selecting board of health members and considering special reports from the board.

#### FINANCIAL SUMMARY

In 2022, ZMCHD had an operating budget of approximately \$6,768,761. We had access to three different COVID-related grants totaling \$442,757.49. Most chronic diseases --such as cancer, diabetes, hypertension, stroke, heart disease respiratory diseases, arthritis, obesity and oral diseases-- can be prevented by eating well, being physically active, avoiding tobacco and excessive drinking, and getting regular health screenings.

<u>HEAL (Healthy Eating Active Living)</u> is a policy, systems, and environmental assessment and planning tool. This initiative works to stimulate change and empower the community to eat healthy foods and be physically active through community engagement.

<u>Maternal & Child Health</u> works to improve the health and well-being of mothers, children, and families. The focus of 2022 was on preconception health and ensuring that all women are prepared for a healthy pregnancy.

The purpose of <u>Tobacco Prevention Education</u> is to reduce youth tobacco use by helping young people grades 6-12 make healthful tobacco related decisions through tobacco specific education instruction and activities that build knowledge as well as social skills and youth development assets.

<u>WIC (Women, Infants & Children)</u> aims to safeguard the health of low income women, infants, and children up to age 5 who are at nutritional risk by providing nutritious foods to supplement diets, information on healthy eating, and referrals to health care providers and social service agencies.

<u>Communicable Disease Prevention & Control</u> works in partnership with the community to promote health and quality of life and to protect the public from the spread of communicable diseases and the health impact of emergencies.

We complete <u>Disease Investigations</u> for cases of communicable disease that pose highest risk to the public.

<u>Emergency Preparedness</u> coordinates with health care and emergency medical service providers on preventing, detecting, quickly responding to, and recovering from any type of emergency that impacts your health, particularly those emergencies whose scale, timing, or unpredictability threatens to overwhelm routine capabilities.

Epidemiology collects and analyzes data on cases of communicable disease.

<u>Project DAWN/Naloxone</u> program provides training and free naloxone kits to reduce opioid overdose and drug-related deaths.

<u>Safe Point Disease Prevention Program</u> protects the public and first responders by providing safe needle disposal and reducing the presence of needles in the community.

We distribute state-supplied <u>Vaccinations</u> to health care providers, assess vaccination status of children, and sponsor vaccination clinics and maintain a small computerized registry of vaccinations records for children from birth to 18-years-old. We also provide vaccinations for adults and travelers.

Environmental Health focuses on the relationships between people and their environment by working to reduce hazards in water, soil, and food to protect people and provide communities with healthier environments.

Staff inspects <u>body</u> <u>art establishments</u>, <u>campgrounds</u>, <u>food service operations</u>, <u>manufactured home parks</u>, <u>public bathing beaches</u>, <u>pools and spas</u>, <u>commercial and residential plumbing</u>, <u>school buildings</u>, <u>sewage treatment systems</u>, <u>and private water systems</u>.

<u>Backflow prevention</u> devices ensure no water flows back along the desired flow direction, ensuring that any chemicals, toxins, or debris won't make their way back into a clean water supply. We identify backflow devices to ensure testing.

We investigate <u>indoor smoking complaints</u>, <u>trash and solid waste complaints</u>, and help qualified residents with the removal of solid waste from their property.

Staff monitors <u>animal bites and mosquitoes</u> to prevent the spread of rabies, West Nile Virus, and Zika Virus.



Family & Community Health & Wellness provides a variety of services and education to help families raise healthy children and create a safe environment where they can learn and grow. The first five years of a child's life build the foundation that shapes children's future health, happiness, growth, development, and learning achievement in life. Children and families enrolled in our programs show improvements in their health, developmental outcomes and increased school readiness.

Bridges to Wellness is a program that primarily focuses on pregnant women and connects families to local resources in to help them become stronger and healthier. Car Seat Safety Program provides free car seats to low-income families. CMH (Children with Medical Handicaps) helps children and youth with special health care needs. Cribs for Kids provides cribs to eligible families who do not have a safe place for their baby to sleep.

<u>Early Intervention</u> provides service coordination and support to families of young children to ensure they receive needed interventions to overcome developmental delays or connect them with needed resources based on their diagnosis. <u>Help Me Grow Home Visiting</u> improves the health and well-being of families with young children and pregnant women by encouraging bonding and strengthening parenting skills.

<u>Lead Case Management</u> monitors children with elevated blood lead levels, which put children at risk for lower IQ and difficulty paying attention. <u>Smart Choices, Strong Families</u> is a recovery support program for pregnant and postpartum women and helps link them to resources. <u>Social Work</u> provides a range of services to people who require public health assistance and community programs to enhance their social, environmental, emotional and behavioral health needs.



































# **Administration**

The <u>Birth & Death Records</u> office provides services which include: issuing certified copies of certificates for births (occurring in Ohio only) and deaths (occurring in Muskingum County, Ohio only) from 1908 to present (\$22 per certificate); registering all births, deaths, and fetal deaths occurring in Muskingum County; issuing burial permits; assisting single parents with completing "Acknowledgment of Paternity Affidavits;" assisting with correcting birth and death certificates issued in Franklin County.

The <u>Finance</u> office provides financial management of federal and state grants and reports of all finances.

The <u>Human Resources</u> office provides position recruiting, labor relations, and human resources management.

The <u>Public Information</u> office works to gather, process, and disseminate essential information; provides media relations and web support; and oversees public records requests.






